

## Dame Alice Leigh's Almshouse, Stoneleigh

he almshouse is a wonderful old building which is admired locally and internationally. Being an old sandstone building, it requires a lot of upkeep. This year, the building is undergoing quite a number of renovations and additions, which some of you will be interested to hear about.

The white paintwork at the back of the almshouse is being renewed this summer. Also, there will be some scaffolding in place while the terracotta caps are replaced on our chimney stacks. At the same time, stonemasons (Croft Building and Conservation) will be doing some maintenance work on the roof. The dormer bedroom windows are being refurbished now that we have located local craftsmen to undertake the work. Internally, a couple of the units are having new kitchens and flooring fitted. Finally, work has just been completed to provide the residents with a resin-bound path which links the almshouse to the outhouses and the gate on Church Lane. The path will assist those residents who use mobility aids and will be a great help in getting the waste bins to the gate.

I hope that nearby neighbours will not be too adversely affected while this essential work is undertaken. As trustees, our role is to look after our lovely old building and to provide a safe, comfortable home for our residents. All of the work being done in 2025 is an investment for the future.

## In the Land of the Giants

t the end of May the 5th Kenilworth Scout Group, of which I am Chairman, undertook an ambitious trip to Northern Ireland. 14 young people, with six leaders, visited many of the historic landmarks this part of the UK has to offer, and gained an understanding of "The Troubles". We arrived on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> May to leaden skies dominated by the bright yellow towers of Samson and Goliath!



Day 1: First stop – the iconic Titanic Museum to explore the secrets of over 100 years ago; a fascinating and huge learning experience for everyone. We then moved on to our accommodation, Ardnavally Scout Centre in Belfast, which was to be our base for the week.

Day 2: We met up with local Scouts to go to the Mourne Mountains. We walked through the famous Hare's Gap at 600m on the Mourne Wall -22 miles of natural granite built to separate livestock from the catchment area of the reservoir. A traditional campfire was held in the evening, again with the local Scouts.

Day 3: A visit to the Antrim coast via the Dark Hedges made famous in the Games of Thrones series, and on to the Carrick-a-Rede rope bridge. We crossed to Carrick-a-Rede Island with trepidation! Then back for another campfire, where we were visited by a less able non-Scouting DofE group, who experienced their first ever Scout campfire.

Day 4: Out to the Causeway coast and an encounter with Finn MacCool, rival of the Scottish giant, Benandonner. We all enjoyed stepping on the array of hexagonal basalt stones. Then on to Londonderry and to the Peacemakers' Museum. The young people were intrigued to realise that youngsters their own age were involved in the petrol bombing and stone throwing on the bog side in the 70s.

Day 5: A visit to the Belfast Activity Centre, where we all joined in the traditional Scouting activities of climbing, caving and canoeing.

Day 6: Our trip wouldn't have been complete without a journey around Belfast on the Hop On Hop Off open-top bus tour on our final day. Again, this engaged the young people as we travelled between Catholic and Protestant areas, noting the different styles of memorials and murals along the Falls Road and Shankhill Road. The bus tour also went alongside the 45ft-high Peace Wall constructed in 1969, and through the division gates, which are still to this day closed at dusk. Once again, Scouting at its best, promoting learning opportunities and skills for life.

On Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> June at 7.30pm in the Village Hall, we shall hear from another of our members, Quentin Compton-Bishop, who, in "From Smyrna to Stoneleigh", will be tracing his own family origins back to the Ottoman Empire. In the 19<sup>th</sup> century, there were thriving communities of western Europeans there, known as "Levantines", engaged in shipping, trade and diplomacy, with Smyrna (now Izmir) being a cosmopolitan hub. All visitors are most welcome to what will definitely be a fascinating talk.

We, together with the Stoneleigh Male Voice Choir, were delighted that our "VE Day 80" event raised £1000. This money will be equally divided between the Royal British Legion and Stoneleigh Church. We should like to thank everyone who made the event such a success.






## **Stoneleigh Community Orchard**

t is with some concern that this month's article reports an issue that has started to emerge in the orchard. An unusually warm and dry spring has consequently led to an explosion in the population of an insect pest called the Apple Ermine moth. In spring, moth eggs hatch on the tree and manifest themselves as cobweb-like tents filled with Kafkaesque colonies of caterpillars that move along the length of the branch, consuming the leaves and defoliating the tree. I've read that these insects have decimated trees in orchards throughout the land, and Stoneleigh orchard is no different.

As this article is being written, the insect has just entered its pupal stage in which the colonies metamorphose into cocoons within their tents. Later in the summer, the cocoons will transform into moths which will breed and lay eggs, with the cycle repeating next spring. Members of the orchard team have taken the relative inertia of this pupal stage of the insects' life cycle to prune out the tents in a slash-and-burn strategy. The job is a huge undertaking given the size of the orchard and the extent of the infestation. Though many ecologists argue that trees can recover, it is indisputable that they are left in a severely weakened condition and may perish during the winter months. Some early observations are that certain varieties of apple tree have suffered more than others, specifically Michelin and Tom Putt, though it is too early to form a hypothesis. Further reading indicates that, if the problem is not treated early, it will increase exponentially year-on-year. The consensus amongst the orchard team is to tackle the problem using multiple techniques. We may well be forced to spray using a biological insecticide in the spring of next year shortly before the eggs hatch into caterpillars. Other suggestions involve the installation of multiple tit boxes as these birds predate on the caterpillars. There are also pheromone traps designed to attract and kill the male moths, and we have even considered the use of AI drones, although this is cost-prohibitive. In conclusion, the orchard team will have their work cut out to manage this problem, and I would urge readers who spot this infestation in apple trees within their own gardens to tackle it immediately.

To change the subject and consider more positive events that occurred in May and June, the Orchard Group undertook a post-Blossom-Festival meeting to review what turned out to be a highly successful event, which has great potential going forward. At this meeting, and in line with our CIC status, we agreed to make a donation to the Stoneleigh Church maintenance fund.

We will shortly be sending another 350 litres of cider for bottling, given the popularity of the carbonated product, and this should be available in early July ready for the hot summer months.

Finally, Stoneleigh Village Club have taken delivery of Wicker the Cider Nicker for their midsummer event and Duck Race. He is currently undertaking sentry duty under the lamppost at Motslow bridge.
